These ancient writings come out of Egypt during a time when Greek and Latin philosophy were at their peak. The people to whom they were addressed are thought to be fictitious, much as the Greek writers wrote to fictitious characters, but the content of the treatises was largely responsible for waking up Europe before the Renaissance. They have long been the influence for the Hermetic way of life.

Corpus Hermetica - Ancient Texts

The treatises presently known as the Corpus Hermeticum, which appear to have diverse authorship and to represent differing and even incompatible philosophical viewpoints, seem to have been brought together as a single body of writings by the time of the great Byzantine scholar Psellus in the eleventh century.

The Hermetica are Greek wisdom texts from the 2nd and 3rd centuries CE, mostly presented as dialogues in which a teacher, generally identified with Hermes Trismegistus or "thrice-greatest Hermes ", enlightens a disciple. The texts discuss the nature of the divine, mind, nature and the cosmos: some touch upon alchemy, astrology and related concepts.
