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for Testicular Cancer provide an evidence- and consensus-based treatment approach for the management of adult patients with seminomatous and nonseminomatous testicular GCTs.

Testicular GCTs are sensitive to platinum-based chemotherapy, and patients have high cure rates even with metastatic disease.

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consists of orchiectomy and may include other surgery, radiation therapy, and chemotherapy, depending on the disease stage and tumor type. Testicular cancer screening A self-exam is the best way to detect this cancer early. UMMC Cancer Center and Research Institute doctors recommend that, beginning in their teens, men examine their testicles monthly. Knowing the normal shape, size, and weight of the testicles will help detect any changes,

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should any occur.

Prostate and Testicular Cancer Screening and Diagnosis ...

Hold your penis out of the way and examine each testicle separately. Hold your testicle between your thumbs and fingers with both hands and roll it gently between your fingers. Look and feel for any hard lumps or nodules (smooth

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rounded masses) or any change in the size, shape, or consistency of your testicles.

Because of the excellent cure rate, about 20,000 are surviving with cancer and 200,000 have been cured at any given time in the United States. Testis cancer is most common in men in their late 20s and early 30s, with an average age of diagnosis of 33 years old. In fact, testis cancer is the most

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common malignancy among men 20 to 40 years old.

Stage 1 Testicular Cancer Surveillance Recommendations.

These ANZUP recommendations have been developed by the Germ Cell Subcommittee of ANZUP, and are

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provided for use within Australia and New Zealand. It is recommended that all centres use standardised protocols for follow-up of Stage I testicular cancer which are based on the expected frequency, timing and pattern of disease recurrence; and minimise unnecessary radiation exposure.

Testicular cancer is the most common malignancy among men between 14 and 44 years of age, and its incidence has risen over the past two decades in Western countries. Both genetic and environmental factors contribute to

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the development of testicular cancer, for which cryptorchidism is the most common risk factor.
