In 1884, the colonial government's shift to a modern taxation system formally abolished the tribute categories that had distinguished the Chinese mestizo from the naturales, although in larger urban areas the colonial governance mechanism of having separate gremios or corporate councils for naturales and Chinese mestizos, especially for civil and ceremonial affairs, was not immediately discontinued.

Convinced that the Spanish government was not willing to undertake widespread reform, Filipinos in the Manila area began organizing themselves in a secret society, the Katipunan, hoping to achieve independence and reform through revolution. Revolutionary war began in August 1896, and when a Spanish offensive nullified early Filipino success in the area surrounding Manila, the Filipinos embarked upon a guerrilla war.
