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Virtue Ethics And The Problem

Another problem with virtue-based ethical systems is the question of what the "right" sort of character is. Many, if not most, virtue theorists have treated the answer to this question as self-evident, but it is anything but. One person's virtue may be another person's vice and a vice in one set of circumstances may be a virtue in another.

An important topic in virtue ethics is the idea that virtue is something learned and developed in a sustained and continuing way from early childhood through to the rest of one's life. Yet this insight is the source of two persistent problems that threaten to undermine virtue ethics as a moral theory. In this chapter solutions to both problems are proposed from within the framework of virtue ethics.

The alleged problem with virtue ethics is that it fails to appreciate the perspectival, theory ladenness, and intractability of dispute, for it is commonly assumed that in virtue ethics a virtuous agent is both the determinant of right action and the repository of sound reasoning about which actions are right. According to critics, a major problem with the theory is the difficulty of establishing the nature of the virtues, especially as different people, cultures and societies often have vastly different opinions on what constitutes a virtue.

First, virtue ethics is self-effacing, as Simon Keller (2004) argues, for the considerations it advances should not always serve as motives for action. Second, the 'indeterminacy problem' states that virtue ethics fails to be action guiding. In light of these issues, there is no particular advantage of virtue ethics over other moral theories.
